Description of Proposed Consolidation

The Boards of Directors for the East County and San Miguel Consolidated Fire Protection Districts (FPD) have submitted unanimous resolutions requesting consolidation of both agencies into a successor district that would be known as the San Miguel Consolidated Fire Protection District. Consolidation is proposed to ensure and enhance the on-gong provision of structural fire protection and emergency medical services within a southwesterly sub-region of unincorporated San Diego County. The consolidated district would abut the cities of El Cajon, La Mesa, Lemon Grove, and San Diego and provide a critical component of first-responder service within the urban/wildland interface.

The consolidated agency would: (1) produce savings by eliminating duplicate functions and staffing; (2) establish centralized administration of sub-regional resources; (3) develop a broader and deeper emergency workforce; (4) expand community education and preparedness programs; (5) implement universal training and development of emergency services personnel; (6) engage in strategic sub-regional planning for fire protection and EMS (7) reduce risk and liability by improving sub-regional medical oversight; and (8) create efficiencies within facility and fleet maintenance programs.

Assets and liabilities of the current FPDs would transfer to the consolidated district. The consolidated FPD will be authorized to levy and collect all previously-approved special assessments; terms and conditions of consolidation would restrict expenditure of voter-approved tax revenue to areas where currently collected. All stations within both former agencies would remain operational and fully staffed. Employees of the current districts would become employees of the consolidated agency with seniority and compensation provisions established under current MOUs and agreements with representative employee groups, which specifically address the proposed consolidation.

Consolidation was initiated by unanimous resolutions of the subject agencies; accordingly, State Law requires LAFCO to approve or conditionally approve the proposal. Consolidation could occur without an election if less than 25 percent of voters or landowners file objections at the protest hearing that would be held subsequent to LAFCO approval. The East County and San Miguel Boards of Directors have resolved that current East County Directors will resign and the seven Directors of the San Miguel FPD Board will serve out their current terms of office as the initial Board of Directors for the consolidated agency. Voters within the consolidated district will select subsequent, at-large directors; the terms of four current San Miguel Directors will expire in December 2008.

Description of Subject Agencies

The San Miguel Consolidated FPD emerged from a 1988 consolidation of the Grossmont-Mt Helix and Spring Valley FPDs. The District covers approximately 40 square miles and has approximately 109,000 residents. The East County FPD was similarly created by a 1994 consolidation of the Bostonia and Crest FPDs. The District includes approximately .45 mile within the geographically discrete services areas of Bostonia and Crest (see attached map) and a population of approximately 14,000 residents.

The Bostonia service area is included within the City of El Cajon's sphere-of-influence. The City is opposing the consolidation as proposed and recommends that LAFCO eliminate the Bostonia area from the consolidation. The City hypothesizes that, because the current San Miguel FPD has no contiguous border with the Bostonia area, responses to Bostonia from the San Miguel FPD would come through the City of El Cajon. Moreover, the City suggests that services to the Bostonia area could be provided more efficiently via a City service contract. Presumably, it is envisioned that the East County FPD would be retained in the Bostonia area to allow a City-District contract to be executed.

The East County FPD was included in the May 2007 LAFCO conditional approval of the Reorganization of Structural Fire Protection and Emergency Medical Services in Unincorporated San Diego County—Phase I. The Phase I Reorganization would need to be amended to remove the East County FPD prior to the Commission considering the consolidation of the San Miguel Consolidation and the East County FPD. A sphere of influence would be adopted for the newly consolidated San Miguel FPD that would reflect the current spheres of the East County and San Miguel FPDs. Therefore, it is



Thank you for the opportunity to respond to the proposed consolidation of the East County and San Miguel Consolidated Fire Protection Districts. It is a mystery as to how these two distinct areas of Bostonia and Crest were ever combined into a single Fire Protection District in the first place, as they clearly have no contiguous borders and are two very different geographical areas. The fact that they are a single jurisdiction; however, should not preclude reasonable examination of a further consolidation.

The City of El Cajon opposes the consolidation based on the facts that the Bostonia area of the District is surrounded by the City of El Cajon and the City's fire resources. It is also within the City's Sphere of Influence as approved by LAFCO. It has no contiguous border with San Miguel and any response from San Miguel would have to come through the City of El Cajon. Regarding the Crest portion of the ECFP District, it is certainly contiguous to the San Miguel FPD and makes sense to consolidate.

The City is proposing that the two areas be treated separately and that should San Miguel wish to consolidate with Crest that they be allowed to do so. The Bostonia area; however, should be served by the closest resources with the least response time. The City of El Cajon is prepared to make a proposal for contract service and has, in fact, discussed this with the Board of the East County Fire Protection District. Please see the report from the Fire Chief for more information.

As you are aware, the Commission requested that LAFCO staff present a policy discussion paper in April 2008 on the role of LAFCO in developing and implementing water supply and delivery in San Diego County. An information report was prepared and presented to the Commission on April 7, 2008. A copy of the report is attached for reference and discussion. The Commission received the report and requested staff to seek input from the Special Districts Advisory Committee and involved stakeholders prior to further LAFCO review.

San Diego LAFCO Discussion Summary: April 7, 2008 Meeting Role of LAFCO: Water Supply and Delivery

At the April 7, 2008 LAFCO meeting, the Commission discussed the current regional conditions of drought, water supply curtailment, conservation practices, and financial impacts affecting all local agencies and water users. Commissioners expressed interest in further exploring the role that LAFCO may have in water supply and delivery issues. After considerable discussion, the Commission encouraged LAFCO staff to refer the matter to the Special Districts Advisory Committee for review and recommendation. The Commission believes the advisory committee's primary focus should be on four categories of possible LAFCO involvement: (1) Adequacy of LAFCO policies in dealing with water supply and delivery, preservation of agricultural and open space lands, etc.; (2) Need for expanding LAFCO's legislative program to include support and advocacy on water issues pertinent to LAFCO's statutory mission; (3) Update and integration of new LAFCO policies and procedures pertaining to LAFCO's jurisdictional (regulatory) review; and (4) Maximizing the use of outreach efforts to coordinate and collaborate with other stakeholders. The following elaborates on each of the four categories of LAFCO involvement.

Policy

- 1. Review current LAFCO policies on agricultural and open space preservation; annexations and spheres, Regional Water Quality Control Board, etc.
- 2. Determine whether a water policy proposal should be developed and presented to the full commission for review.
 - a. Identify subject areas that should be included in the proposal.

b. Schedule the policy proposal for consideration by the full commission in a workshop environment. Invite stakeholder representatives to participate at the workshop.

Legislation

1. Evaluate the need for adding water supply and delivery issues to the Commission's Legislative Program.

a. Evaluate whether an increased emphasis should be placed on legislative issues pertaining to water supply, reliability, recycled water, groundwater, agricultural preservation, and energy.

b. Consider policy guidelines to promote increased efforts in the above areas, especially in water re-use.

Regulatory

1. Propose updates to LAFCO jurisdictional review procedures to address water supply and delivery issues.

Outreach

1. Establish a stakeholders group to channel input on the update and development of water policies and procedures (Special Districts Advisory Committee, Ad-hoc Cities Advisory Committee, San Diego County Water Authority, Water Quality Control Board, etc.

2. Use the Special Districts Advisory Committee to promote input, and develop concepts prior to reporting back to the Commission.

AREAS OF ADDITIONAL COMMITTEE DISCUSSION INCLUDE:

- A. San Diego County Water Authority and Metropolitan Water District programs to increase water supply reliability.
- B. Applicability of County Water Authority and Metropolitan Water District Interruptible Agriculture Water Program and impact on agricultural land preservation.
- C. Efforts that could be taken to protect agricultural lands from being taken out of production.
- D. Identify barriers in regulatory policies that constrain use and re-use of water, including recycled water, groundwater recharges, greywater, and desalination.
- E. Evaluate policy areas to improve water reliability and re-use including facilities distribution, customer incentives and pricing for all sectors, including efforts to preserve agricultural uses.
- F. Evaluate opportunities to promote watershed management and live stream discharge.
- G. Review regulatory changes and other changes to increase local water supplies (participation of federal and state agencies and grant funding).

SUBJECT: May 2008 Legislative Report

This is the monthly Legislative Report for May 2008. As discussed at the April meeting, LAFCO staff identified and reviewed a number of bills that have been added to our legislative tracking system. An updated bill summary matrix on bills being tracked is provided for commission review, discussion, and possible action. LAFCO staff will be prepared to give an update on each of the bills at the May 2008 meeting.

At the April meeting, the Commission authorized positions on four bills. Support positions were adopted for SB 1191 (Alquist), SB 1458 (Senate Local Government Committee), AB 1998 (Silva), and AB 2484 (Caballero). Letters of support were sent on these bills. CALAFCO is also supporting these bills. LAFCO staff recommended "Watch" on seven additional bills to allow time for input from stakeholders and for probable amendments. These bills included three by Senator Kehoe addressing fire protection and fuel management policy in wildland areas. Since last month, one bill (SB 1617) has been acted upon and is being considered by the Senate Appropriation Committee. It includes a dwelling unit fee for State Responsibility Areas (SRA).

After the discussion of LAFCO's role with water issues at the last meeting, LAFCO staff has begun monitoring legislation on water supply and reliability. One bill (SB 1391 – Padilla) that addresses the use of recycled water for groundwater recharge, is now being tracked. It is sponsored by the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California and supported by many local water agencies including City of San Diego. LAFCO staff recommends a "Support" position on the bill.

An updated bill matrix is provided for your information. It is therefore,
